

TSR Insight: Prospective Postgraduate decision making

Methodology: Online survey to current undergraduates (second year and above), graduates and others considering postgraduate study

Fieldwork: September – October 2023

Base: 135 responses



Interest and benefits of postgraduate study

The majority (86%) of those surveyed were open to postgraduate study. Around one third were definitely considering it.


Q: Are you considering postgraduate study? (Single response)



Respondents identified a range of career and personal development benefits to undertaking postgraduate study, on average each selecting around five benefits to study. Most frequently mentioned were gaining skills and knowledge (59%) and enhancing earning potential (54%). Broadening career options and enabling career progression were also considered benefits by over half of respondents.

Personal benefits around enjoying their subject were also recognised; specialising in an area of interest and being able to continue their learning were mentioned by around half each.

Q: Which if any of the following do you think are the benefits of postgraduate study? (Multiple response)



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
Concerns about postgraduate study

Almost all (94%) had concerns about postgraduate study. The primary concern was the cost of tuition fees (67%). Around half were also keen to start earning.

However, there also seems to be scope for providers to provide further information about the options available – one in five said they didn't know enough about it and around one in six (16%) were not sure what postgraduate courses were available.

Providing reassurance about what is required may also be valuable, as 16% were concerned they may not be able to do the work.

Other comments included

"I don't know how I would manage the work load as well as having to work due to no other way of finding the tuition fees."

"I don't need PG because I will graduate with an undergrad masters degree"

"I am not sure what I have a passion for" "Whether it is worth it in the long run, or will it just burn me out and be a waste of time and money"

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Prospective postgraduates were concerned about the rising costs of living and how it was impacting them

Most (84%) had concerns about rising living costs, feeling anxious, worried or scared.

84% of prospective PGs were very or quite concerned about rising costs of living


More than two-fifths (43%) were worried whether they could afford postgraduate study. Getting value for money was also a concern (39%).

Information around financial support may be valued; while almost two-fifths (38%) said they would look for universities offering scholarships and bursaries, the same proportion didn't expect to be eligible for any. Almost one third (31%) were worried about finding financial support.

The impact on parents was also notable at this level, 38% were concerned how their study may impact their parents, 19% said their parents were worried about the costs.
